


From translating Karl Marx...

British Online Archives' latest collection, *Marxist History and Historians in the 20th Century, 1883-1957*, contains the personal papers of Dona Torr, a prominent historian and member of the Communist Party of Great Britain (CPGB).

Torr was cited as a major influence by the likes of E.P. Thompson and Eric Hobsbawm.



The collection is part of the wide-ranging British Communism At Home and Abroad series.



It encompasses more than 10,000 unique images.

Not detaching herself from this history, she was also a founding member of the CPGB and gained plaudits for her devotion to the communist cause.

The documents largely focus on the gritty and conflictual history of the labour movement in Britain, with particular emphasis on the life of labour figure Thomas Mann.

According to Dr. David Renton, "[s]he was decidedly strict over questions of party discipline...Torr's break with her own family came at a cost. It was a surrogate to her."


