
World News in Indian Newspapers, 1782-1908 contains copies of three English language newspapers published in India during the period 1782-1908: The India Gazette (1782-1834); The Bengal Hurkaru and Chronicle (1822-1866); and The Bengal Times (1876-1908).

These newspapers were primarily sold to colonial businessmen, merchants, and administrators with an interest in regional and international trade.

This collection contains more than 100,000 unique images.

Subjects covered range from the American Revolution and the Crimean War to British parliamentary debates on the India Act of 1858 and the dramatic industrial and pharmaceutical breakthroughs of the late 19th and early 20th centuries.

According to Benjamin Holt from the University of Leeds, the collection "provides scholars with an unparalleled and comprehensive insight into the nature of British colonial rule in India, revealing how its rulers and functionaries saw both themselves and their subjects, and how that perception changed along with the world around them."
